Sue H made some Quick Kichlach biscuits

2 eggs beaten
1/4 pint sunflower oil
2 teasp. vanilla essence
1 teasp. grated lemon rind
5oz. castor sugar
8oz. SR flour
Pinch of salt



2 teasp. oil

1oz. castor sugar

Decoration - Cherries, walnuts, chocolate drops or flaked almonds

Oven temperature Gas mark 6 or Electric 200 degrees C. Makes 36

- 1. Stir eggs, oil, vanilla essence and rind together. Blend in the sugar
- 2. Stir in the flour and salt and mix to a soft dough.
- 3. Drop a teasp. of mixture onto a greased baking tray, 2inches apart
- **4.** Dip the base of a tumbler in some oil then into sugar and flatten each biscuit.
- **5.** Sprinkle with the decoration and bake for 8 10 minutes

Freeze - 3 months

One of them was on the theme of spiders where I sang the nursery rhyme 'Incy Wincy Spider' and showed the children some spider webs in our garden.
